Planning Application submitted for co-located hospital on the site of Cork University Hospital

Cork University Hospital and Beacon Medical Group (BMG) are pleased to announce that a planning application has been submitted today, 10th January, 2008 for a co-located hospital on the grounds of Cork University Hospital. The new facility will represent an investment of almost €242m by BMG. When fully operational the new hospital will directly employ over 511 staff. With additional indirect employment of approximately 787 people, the new hospital is expected to make a significant positive contribution to the local economy.

Construction is planned for completion within 24 months from the start date.

The hi-tech, state-of-the-art hospital will comprise 175 single rooms with 8 CCU beds, 6 operating theatres, ambulatory surgery and full diagnostics incorporating some €25.8m worth of new generation equipment. The gross floor area will encompass approximately 32,893 sq metres. The hospital will mirror the case-mix of the public hospital, in that all specialities catered for in the public hospital will also be catered for in the co-located hospital – both medical and surgical, with the exception of national specialities. There will be a joint governance structure to manage shared issues.

Further to the recommendations of the SARI Report 2005, all rooms will be single occupancy, each with its own en-suite facility, offering enhanced patient benefit with regard to infection control standards and patient privacy. The co-located hospital facilitates an adaptive care model, whereby patients can stay in their designated room even if their medical status changes.

The co-located hospital will comply with HIQA directions. It will also comply with all legal requirements relating to quality and standards issued by the Minister of Health, the HSE and any other appropriate governmental regulatory body. The Joint Commission International (JCI) accreditation process will commence six months after opening as is required by the JCI.

Background to Co-located Private Hospitals Project

In July 2005, the Irish Government issued a policy direction to the HSE under section 10 of the Health Act 2004 to implement the Co-located Private Hospitals Project. The project was aimed at freeing up additional beds for public patients in public hospitals and the development of private hospital facilities on public hospital sites.

No public land is being sold to successful bidders. The hospitals will be privately operated hospitals for the provision of health care to public and private patients alike and not exclusive to private patients.

The new co-located hospitals will allow for 24/7 admission from the public hospital, the public Emergency Department (ED), primary care centres and through GP referrals. They will have the capacity to treat all private patients currently catered for in Public Hospitals thereby freeing up public beds for additional public patients.

As part of the partnership approach between the public and co-located hospitals, where the Public Hospital is full and the Private facility has capacity, there will be a Service Level Agreement (SLA) in place for the Private hospital to take in Public patients. The reverse may also apply. Similarly, where there is a deficiency of certain medical equipment and other infrastructure in the public hospital, it has been agreed that the Private hospital will supply and enter a Service Level Agreement with the public facility to provide these.

About CUH

Cork University Hospital (CUH) is the largest university teaching hospital in Cork City and the only Level 1 Trauma centre in the Republic of Ireland. CUH has 25,500 inpatient admissions, 27,000 day cases, and 58,000 emergency cases (A&E) annually, making it one of the busiest hospitals in the country. CUH has an annual budget of nearly €300 million and employs in excess of 3,000 staff. CUH participates in the Irish Health Services Accreditation process and will become fully accredited in the next couple of years.

CUH is the only hospital in Ireland that provides the full range of medical and surgical specialties on one site. The range of specialities delivered by the hospital, including: Cardiac services (Cardiology and Cardio-thoracic Surgery), Neurosciences, General Surgery and Urology, Ophthalmology, Emergency Medicine and Trauma Services, Radiotherapy and Oncology, Orthopaedics, Gynaecology, General Medicine including Medicine of the Elderly, Endocrinology/Diabetes, Gastroenterology, Nephrology (Renal Medicine), Respiratory Medicine, Rheumatology, Haematology, Pain Relief, Paediatrics Services and Dental Surgery.

By 2010, with the maternity hospital and the cardiac renal project complete, the number of inpatient beds on the CUH campus will exceed 1,000.
